


Rapid Transit Stations Update



Crews finish pouring concrete on the pedestrian bridge deck north of University Avenue.

The pedestrian bridge deck in the State Route 15 (SR 15) median north of University Avenue has been paved with concrete, and crews have made great progress building the staircase leading to the pedestrian bridge south of University Avenue. Drainage work has begun at the south end of the project, just north of Interstate 805. Additionally, crews have continued forming transit station walls in the SR 15 median north and south of El Cajon Boulevard.

As the safety of motorists and workers is the highest priority, the majority of construction work takes place at night to minimize traffic impacts. Night work also allows construction vehicles to move safely in and out of construction zones. Crews will work to minimize noise and light impacts to the surrounding neighborhoods. SR 15 Commuter Bikeway Update

The separated bikeway, which will extend from Adams Avenue to Camino Del Rio South along the east shoulder of northbound SR 15, continues to take shape. Construction crews have completed most of the work on the retaining walls that will align the bikeway's path. Crews have begun constructing the bottom section of the bikeway between the walls and are preparing to install a storm drain. Both day and night work is scheduled over the coming weeks, and intermittent closures are expected on the northbound SR 15 to Interstate 8 connector ramp, as well as the Adams Avenue on-ramp and Camino Del Rio South off-ramp on northbound SR 15. The bikeway is anticipated to be open to the public by late spring 2017.

The \$65 million project will build San Diego's first freeway-level transit stations along SR 15 at El Cajon Boulevard and University Avenue. New 2.5-mile transit-only lanes also will be constructed within the existing SR 15 median from just north of Interstate 805 to just south of Interstate 8. The SR 15 Mid-City Centerline Rapid Transit Stations Project is expected to be completed in summer 2017.

In November, voters countywide will be asked whether they support a ballot measure to invest in highway, transit, bike and pedestrian, open space, and local infrastructure projects.
