

Rapid Transit Stations Update




Crews have finished installing the first decorative relief panel along transit station walls at El Cajon Boulevard.

Transit station walls in the State Route 15 (SR 15) median, north and south of El Cajon Boulevard, are taking shape, and the first decorative relief panel has been installed along the wall. Ongoing construction activities include building the staircase that will lead to the pedestrian bridge south of University Avenue, and storm drainage work at the south end of the project, just north of Interstate 805

As the safety of motorists and workers is the highest priority, the majority of construction work takes place at night to minimize traffic impacts. Night work also allows construction vehicles to move safely in and out of construction zones. Crews will work to minimize noise and light impacts to the surrounding neighborhoods. Thank you for your patience during construction.

SR 15 Commuter Bikeway Update

Construction crews have been working for the past several months to prepare and install retaining walls to align the path for the SR 15 Commuter Bikeway. A unique view of how these walls are being constructed is shown in the photo below. Daytime construction is anticipated for the beginning of October, as work continues to finish the walls. Crews will begin widening the east shoulder along SR 15 from Adams Avenue to Camino Del Rio South in mid- to late-October, and night work is anticipated for this activity.



Retaining walls are being constructed along the new bikeway, which extends from Adams Avenue to Camino Del Rio South along the east shoulder of northbound SR 15.



Project Summary

The \$65 million project will build San Diego's first freeway-level transit stations along SR 15 at El Cajon Boulevard and University Avenue. New 2.5-mile transit-only lanes also will be constructed within the existing SR 15 median from just north of Interstate 805 to just south of Interstate 8. The SR 15 Mid-City Centerline *Rapid* Transit Stations Project is expected to be completed in summer 2017.
