Project Nearing Halfway Completion Mark

A great deal has been achieved since the Interstate 5 (I-5)/ Genesee Avenue Interchange Project began in February 2015. Over the past year, crews have focused on building the north side of the new bridge, started work on 12 retaining walls surrounding the interchange, and began construction on a special new feature – a separated bike path along the west side of I-5.

Over the next few months, crews will complete the north side of the bridge and Caltrans will switch traffic to the new bridge. Then the existing bridge will be demolished and the south side of the bridge will be built. Please watch for future e-blasts, follow us on social media, or check the project webpage for updates on the traffic switch. Throughout 2016, crews will continue work on the retaining walls around the interchange, as well as the bike path. Read more about the bike path in the article on page 2.

The three-year project will replace the existing Genesee Avenue bridge with a ten-lane structure that will include additional vehicle lanes, bike lanes, sidewalks, and will better accommodate current and future travel demands in one of the most congested and job-intensive corridors in San Diego County. This \$105.2 million project is funded through a combination of federal, state, and regional *TransNet* revenue sources, and partnerships with City of San Diego and UC San Diego.

New Bike Path Will Connect Sorrento Valley, UC San Diego, Hospitals, and Nearby Businesses

A key component of the I-5/Genesee Avenue Interchange Project is the planned bike path on the west side of I-5. Crews are preparing a new retaining wall just west of the freeway in advance of building this improvement.

Currently, people on bikes must use the shoulder on I-5 to travel between Roselle Street/Sorrento Valley Road, Genesee Avenue, and Voigt Drive. When the new bike path is complete, bicyclists and pedestrians will be able to travel in both directions between these points on a separate path that is elevated and passes over Genesee Avenue. Those who wish to go east or west on Genesee Avenue will be able to exit the path without crossing Genesee Avenue traffic.

The path will improve an important connection between the Sorrento Valley COASTER Station and a large number of employers in the Torrey Pines and Golden Triangle area. This unique addition will support the future North Coast Corridor bike network, provide alternative transportation choices, and encourage more people to #GObyBIKEsd.

DID YOU KNOW?

As mitigation for the I-5/ Genesee Avenue Interchange Project, SANDAG and Caltrans purchased 21 acres across two habitat restoration sites in Carmel Valley, known as Deer Canyon and Deer Canyon Uplands. Greening the Interchange After Construction

Early in 2015, vegetation and other landscaping around the construction zone was removed to accommodate the future infrastructure and the safe movement of crews and heavy equipment around the job site. Caltrans will replant the area around the interchange with native, drought-tolerant plants, such as Lemonade Berry, Buckwheat, Cleveland Sage, Coast Sunflowers, and Torrey Pines. Over 600 trees will be planted. The majority of the new landscaping will be irrigated with reclaimed water, aligning with Caltrans' policy on planting and water conservation.


A Glimpse into the Golden Triangle Area Improvements

Facilities for rail, local transit, bikes, and pedestrians will be enhanced alongside highway improvements providing multiple transportation choices for Golden Triangle residents, commuters, and employers. The list on the left of the map is a snapshot of completed, in progress, and upcoming projects. In addition to the I-5/ Genesee Interchange Project, the I-805 North Express Lanes Project is also in construction. On the horizon, the Mid-Coast Trolley construction is anticipated to start in fall 2016.
